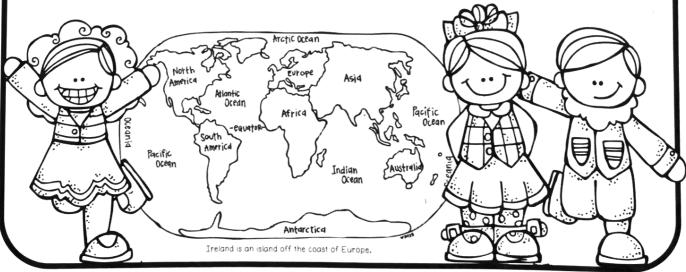
Irish Immigrants
